

## AIHS 2022 Annual Meeting Minutes, November 12, 2022

**The Annual Meeting was called to order at 7pm on 11/12/22 by Bob Bedoll.**

Present were: Bob Bedoll (president), Carol Pascal (vice president), Todd Billett (Secretary), Penne Wilson (Public Information), Rick Anderson (Archives), Leslie Lamb and Virginia Cummings (gift shop). Absent were: Wayne Wallace, Peggy Hodge, Ed Stephenson, and Dave Durrett.

Bob verified that a quorum was present.

Minutes for the 2021 meeting were approved.

### **Bob Bedoll, President:**

Facilities: Our facilities have become a focal point for community events and classes.

Events/Classes: almost 250 classes and events this year, including 150 recurring classes/events, plus almost 100 unique events. (in conjunction with Island Arts)

Membership: 266 members, a new record.

Salmon Bake Meals: served over 700 salmon & rib meals, the most ever.

Silent Auction: raised over \$15,000, the most ever.

Visitors: 1,238, the most ever.

Fundraising Events: Farm Day, Salmon Bake, Apple Squeeze, raised over \$30K, a new record.

Events: Added a new annual event: Juneteenth (in conjunction with Island Arts)

Financial: Over \$180K in reserve, and we'll continue to invest in our future through maintenance and capital improvements.

Facilities: upgraded the farm buildings, grounds, new storage facility. Added New Greenhouse.

Displays: upgraded our displays and collections.

Visitor Engagement: We keep the gift shop open every weekend from April, and the farmhouse and archival building open and staffed every weekend this summer.

Videos: We produced a new documentary, "The Anderson Island Story", shown here and the AIFF, and upgraded our video on-line presence to 27 videos and 22 3-minute shorts.
