He and Margaret came a week ago and we all surprised his Aunt Christine on her 80 th birthday. She's our native matriarch now that Bessie is gone, an outspoken gal who has raised literally thousands of chickens, which have financed a nice home and quite a bit of traveling around. She's slowing down, but still wields a mean spade in her garden.

You must see the quilt in the making, Rosa. The Island scene quilt was raffled at the fair last year and went to Tacoma. So the several artists here are sketching houses, barns, a book called "Island In the Sound", the ferry, chapel, and etc to make a quilt to keep here. It's going to be a real heirloom.

We lost the owner of the Tahoma by contract, you may have seen. He bid too high. Contract to run the new Steilacoom and the Islander standby went to Tom Palmer of Ketron, which, we fear, may win Ketron some more runs, slowing us down on crossings. The Tahoma, we hear, is being sold to Lummi Indians to haul fish. It's still down here at the dock. The owner's daughter, Jill Tokarczyk, is a reporter on the Daily Olympian. I have written Cowlitz County Historical Society again to ask whether any of Leander Wallace's descendants are living. There is a Beardsley who married Charlotte Wallace (Leander's brother Victor's granddaughter who was writing a book. Nancy Pryor sent me a xerox of a ms chapter, which told us nothing. Rick came across a lead we want to trace. The Oregon Journal of May 26, 1940 ran a piece by a Fred Lockley entitled "Leander Wallace." Is the Oregon Journal published in Portland? Daily? I never saw one I guess. Between us, Rick and I are accumulating a great file of
